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Dear Friends of Saint Paul School,

aint Paul School Year 2021-2022 got off to a good start on August 24-25. We began the year with a new principal, Dr. Jacqueline Mumford. She previously staffed with us for three years working with the STEM/ STREAM program and marketing, thanks to funding from Saint Paul School Foundation. She is enjoying the challenges of being principal and doing a fine job. Her primary concern is for our children and their families. Her dedication to our teachers and staff is commendable.

Moving forward with this school year has meant advancing without the presence of Mr. David Pancurak, our former principal. "Mr. P" moved on to a new position with Lisbon schools. We miss him but are grateful for his nine years of love and self-sacrifice in helping to develop Saint Paul School. God bless him and his family. Thank you, Mr. P, for all your hard work and inspiration. I am reminded of all who have come before and all who will come after in the long line of educators and staff at Saint Paul School and remember the words of St. Paul to the Corinthians, "I planted, Apollos watered, but God caused the growth." (1Cor. 3:6)

Mrs. Teresa Sisson is teaching religion classes to children in all our

grades this year. She enjoys the opportunities to share our faith with students and is creative and dynamic in her approach.

On Wednesday, October 6th, we were able to invite a limited number of our students back to Mass for the first time since the pandemic began. Students from second grade, students from sixth grade (to serve as a choir), and our music teacher, Ms. Gina Love, joined our usual attendees for morning Mass. This went very well. Students observed social distancing and followed mask protocols. It was joyful and refreshing to have students with us worshipping the Lord. The other classes will join us in the weeks ahead.

Saint Paul School is the only elementary school in our geographical area with the STEM designation. The State of Ohio recognizes us for effectively integrating hands-on learning in science, technology, engineering, and math. We personally expand it into the areas of art and religion to call it STREAM.

Our religion component this academic year focuses on Catholic culture and Pope Francis' encyclical, Laudato si'. Our faculty attended a diocesan meeting in October on these topics with Bishop Bonnar, Diocesan Schools Superintendent Mrs. Mary Fiala, and others. In Laudato si', Pope Francis calls us to recognize that we need not only doctrine, but a spirituality that helps us appreciate and act with gratitude for God's gifts of nature. We need individual and social conversion so what occurs within us will be evident in the environment around us - less pollution and a better quality of life for all. There are many things we can address locally on this issue.

As we continue, day by day, to educate our students and ourselves in mind, body and spirit, we pray for God to guide us. We put our hope in God and do the best that we can, with God's help, because that is a sure formula for accomplishment.

t. Paul School continues to focus on educating the whole child: mind, body, and spirit. Throughout this pandemic, we faced many challenges. Yet, through perseverance we succeed in our number one priority: to keep our students safe and learning in the building. Aside from mandated remote learning periods after the holiday breaks, our school remained open last year with protocols in place including masking, social distancing, increased handwashing, staggered lunches/recess, frequent sanitizing, and more. We were blessed to end our year with zero student and staff cases of COVID; however, we have seen fatigue resulting from the pandemic on our staff, teachers, families, and community.

Although last year looked different, our students thrived. They adapted quickly and seamlessly to new protocols. Our students and families have been consistently supportive, resilient, and charitable. We are grateful and humbled by everyone's concern and support for one another.

Last year families had the option of students attending on-site or remotely from home. Teachers and fellow students in the building connected to those at home via videoconferencing hardware and software. At the height of 2020-2021, we had over twenty students in quarantine (due to out-of-school exposures) con-

necting through Zoom. Although we have some gaps to close due to the instructional disruptions, we were elated to hear that our St. Paul School students had the top scores on diocesan end-of-year assessments.

We also recognized Father Robert Edwards with a celebration on his 40th anniversary as a priest. In addition, Mrs. Tolson celebrated her 40th year as a teacher at St. Paul School!

Our teachers and staff are working together as a team to find our "new normal." Last year we were unable to use the playground due to restrictions/guidance. However, the Home and School Association funded some rehab/certified specialized wood chips, so our playground was back in business for the start of school! The students cheered as our St. Paul School panther mascot brought them popsicles and shared the big news! We also brought back band, choir, art, and after school clubs this year!

St. Paul School remains the only kindergarten through sixth grade school in our geographical area to be an Ohio designated STEM school. Many schools have STEM programs, but St. Paul School is one that integrates culture, community, careers, and curriculum as a basis for our STREAM (Science Technology Religion Engineering Arts Math) learning ecosys-

tem. The teachers pride themselves on engaging the students' minds while fostering creativity, collaboration, and critical thinking by providing problem-based learning. Last year, all our students in grades K-6 competed statewide in the Ohio STEM Learning Network Design Challenge. Our first, third, and fifth graders made it to the finals. I congratulate our fifth graders for taking first place with their electric recycled tractor. Their prize, a green energy machine solar lab, will be installed at the school later this fall. This will be particularly useful as we continue to explore Laudto si' from Pope Francis as our central STREAM theme.

Though things may look different, just as the sisters did in 1904 when the school was founded, we continue to find the strength to prepare our St. Paul School students as lifelong learners and contributors to our global society. We appreciate your prayers and support, and we continue to keep all of you in our prayers.

Fundraising

COVID-19 has significantly impacted our traditional fundraising efforts. This past school year was particularly hard because the school was unable to secure the Emergency Assistance to Nonpublic Schools (EANS) funds. Bingo has been indefinitely canceled, and we were again unable to hold our large annual auction. Most of our usual fundraisers, such as the Pasta Bowl, track meet parking, the Taste of Pizza fundraiser, and our Mardi Gras dinner, did not take place. These losses alone total over \$100,000 in our anticipated school revenue from fundraising. We have approached this deficit creatively, conducting fundraising in innovative, COVID-compliant ways. We had a very successful golf outing this year, as well as our 10-week raffle selling out. Our teachers, staff, and parent volunteers came together to host monthly drive through dinners, Lenten fish fry events, and multiple small-sale student fundraisers (flowers, holiday items, and catalogs). Our students also designed a successful social distancing "Virtual Egg Hunt" fundraiser that was enjoyed by the community. We continue to work on fundraisers to offset the impact of COVID on our usual fundraising activities. Each time someone makes a monetary donation, participates in our events, supports our small fundraisers by purchasing tickets/ items from our students, or buys a drive-thru monthly meal prepared by our staff, we are extremely grateful. Those dollars directly help our students. Every little bit helps our school survive these exceedingly difficult financial times.

Expanded Music Offerings

Ms. Gina Love has joined us as our music teacher. She also instructs the band and choir ensembles. Ms. Love is often heard playing music during mass at St. Patrick and St. Paul Churches. Last year, we were not able to have choir due to COVID restrictions, but thanks to a sweet corn sale done by the Lee and Miller families, and a pumpkin sale by the Rea family, the school

was able to purchase 20 student guitars. Ms. Love instructed students in grades 3-6 in guitar lessons, which will continue this school year. This fall, Ms. Love has also started teaching band at the school for students in grades 4-6. Students selected their musical instruments and our band will include 17 students playing percussion, 7 flutes, 9 clarinets, 5 trombones, 5 trumpets, and 2 saxophones. We will also be holding an after-school band club for additional practice this year! Students in grades 3-6 also participate in choir ensemble class each week. They are learning hymns and sing at Mass on Wednesdays.

Student Faith Formation

"Let the little children come to me, and do not prevent them; for the Kingdom of heaven belongs to such as these." (Matthew 19: 14)

As we begin another unusual year at St. Paul School, the way we provide for students' faith formation is among the many things we are doing differently. Ms. Sisson has shifted from being our second-grade teacher to teaching religion to all classes. Regardless of their family faith traditions, all students are engaging with the Catholic Faith in a way that encourages their own spiritual growth.

This year, classes at all levels are digging into scripture as the source of all we do as Catholic Christians. Students had been attending Mass remotely, but we have returned to our Wednesday Mass in St. Paul Church. Students in grades four, five, and six have the opportunity to explore the scripture as the foundation of our Catholic traditions and prayers, as well as the way God continues to speak to us, his beloved children.

The young learners in kindergarten and first grade are learning about God's limitless love and our heavenly family. Each day, these learners approach their faith formation bursting with excitement about our Savior, Jesus Christ. This group also enjoys singing songs about God and His creation. Grade three is busy learning about making moral decisions by relying on God's Ten Commandments and the Law of Love. We now know that there is no situation we can face that the guidance of God cannot get us through!

Grade two is, of course, working on their sacramental preparation. While we do not yet have dates for the sacraments, these students have been discussing their free will and consciences, and what it means to sin. They are excited to learn and understand that God's love is eternal and His forgiveness abundant!

To celebrate the Month of the Rosary (October), all classes have been discussing the Rosary, using resources to learn about the prayers of the Rosary, and learning to pray the Hail Mary in sign language. Our multimodal approach to learning clearly extends to all areas, and the students of St. Paul School love it!



Staff Changes

In August 2021, Mr. Pancurak announced he had accepted another position and would be leaving the position of Principal at St. Paul School. His impact and accomplishments during his nine-year tenure are profound—leading the school through multiple successful accreditation visits, obtaining a STEM designation, stabilizing finances, and much, much more. We wish him and his family all the best!

Dr. Jacqueline Mumford was appointed Interim Principal. She is a resident of Salem, Ohio and member of St. Paul Parish. She is married to Richard Mumford and has one son, Taggart (sixth grader at St. Paul School). Dr. Mumford received her B.A., M.S.Ed. and Ph.D. in Education from Purdue University. Mrs. Lindsay (DeMaiolo) Samblanet joins our faculty as our sixth grade homeroom teacher. A St. Paul School alumna and parishioner, she brings expertise to us in language arts and science. She lives in Salem with her husband, Vance, and son, Vinny (in Transitional Kindergarten at St. Paul School). She has a decade of experience as a teacher in Ohio and Arizona!

With our large preschool class size, Mrs. Ashley Davidson joined us as the Preschool Assistant. She is an experienced preschool educator and leads a nonprofit focused on autism resources in the tricounty area, connecting families to existing resources and raising autism awareness. Her three children attend St. Paul School (Olivia, attends preschool, Kyle is a second grader, and Carter is a fourth grader).



Mr. Pancurak, former principal of St. Paul School, will be missed. In his 9 year tenure, he brought numerous positive changes and exceptional programs to the school. We wish him well in his new role!

St. Paul School Enrollment Update

The pandemic continued to hinder our usual student recruitment events. However, we are pleased to report that our enrollment is up by approximately 10%. This year we welcomed 128 students in preschool through Grade 6, with

an average class size of 16. Our students reside in ten different local school districts, and three counties. The school's culture, caring families and communities, and the compassion and expertise of our teachers has contributed greatly to our growth. With a

great team including our parish, school and foundation all working together, we are truly blessed and appreciate how our families and alumni have formed a strong partnership with us to continue to propel our school forward.

Fifth Grade Wins the Ohio STEM Design Challenge

Last year, all 105 of our students in grades K-6 participated in the statewide 2021 Ohio STEM Learning Network (OSLN) Design Challenge. Each class designed and developed a solution addressing the question, "How can we re-imagine energy production or consumption in our community?" Students brainstormed solutions and developed prototypes using our school design process. The kindergarteners designed and built a model covering a Lego version of the school in aluminum foil, and mounting magnifying glasses on the roof to provide free heat. The first graders built the Salem Wind Farm out of pinwheels, Legos, and clay. The second graders proposed the innovative electric "Tesla CyberHouseBoat." The third graders designed and built a model of the Salem Aerial Gondola Mass Transit System using cardboard and string. The fourth graders worked on three designs: A kinetic energy-generating playground; guinea-pig powered vehicles; and a solar panel system on the moon. The fifth graders built a working rechargeable electric garden tractor out of a recycled old lawn tractor with a blown engine. The sixth graders focused on bio-fuel station models and a biofuelpowered recreational vehicle. The STEM advisory board selected first, third, and fifth graders as finalists. We are pleased to announce the St. Paul School fifth graders WON the design competition at the state level! Their prize is being delivered late in October—a Green Energy Solar Lab for our MakerSpace! We are so proud of all our St. Paul School young scholars!

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St. Paul School Foundation Awards Annual Scholarships

A St. Paul School education enriches the lives of its students. It provides an excellent academic foundation to guide students through post graduate studies and future endeavors.

The St. Paul School Foundation awarded its 2021 annual scholarship to four area high school graduates. Each recipient received \$2,000 in financial assistance for his or her first year of college education. The recipients, his or her high schools, and the schools each plan to attend are below. High school seniors who graduated from St. Paul School are eligible for this scholarship. Awards are based on grade point average, parish involvement, two letters of

recommendation, and an essay describing educational and career plans, and the impact of a St.
Paul School Catholic elementary education on the applicant's academic achievement. Since establishing the scholarship in 1995, the foundation has awarded \$122,450 to 137 St. Paul School graduates.


